

Trenton Wins State Harrier Title: Weequahic Grabs Fourth Place

ELIZABETH—Trenton High's cross-country team captured the 28th annual New Jersey State Interscholastic Athletic Association harrier title yesterday at Warinanco Park when it scored 100 points. Bayonne High, a pre-meet dark horse, came in second—three points behind the Capital City team.

Hal Wetzel, ace of the Union High team, which came in third, won the individual honors. He ran the two and one-half-mile course in 13:32.1. Jack Skokos was the first Trenton runner to cross the finish line, coming in 23 yards behind Wetzel. After Skokos, the next four Trenton runners finished 18th, 23rd, 25th and 32nd, totaling 100 points.

Bayonne might have won the championship if its second man, Bill Curran had not been spiked. With 192 runners crowded together at the starting line, Curran was spiked in the first few yards and forced to the sidelines. Curran's injury hampered the Hudson County team because the runner was favored to place among the first ten.

BAYONNE PLACES THREE

As it was, Bayonne placed three runners in the first ten. Bill Walsh finished two seconds after Skokos while Dante De Dominic and Gene Malloy were seventh and eighth, respectively. Bayonne's fourth and fifth placers, however, finished 28th and 57th, bringing the total to 103. Union also got off to a flying start but, like Bayonne, the last two of the five finished far back. Jack Segale, Union's No. 2 man, crossed the tape two seconds after Walsh. Bill Vesey was 24th. The next two were 43rd and 44th, causing the Union total to soar to 115.

Newark teams did better than was expected of them with Weequahic finishing fourth with 139 points. Bernie Weltchek, who with Mickey Edelston, has led the Indians all season finished fourth in 13:41. Edelston gave Weequahic two men in the first ten, when he placed ninth. The next three Indians came in 29th, 35th and 61st.

JEFFS CRIPPLED

Robert Kereskes of New Brunswick took fifth and Harvey Latourette of Millburn rounded out the first ten, coming in four seconds after Edelston.

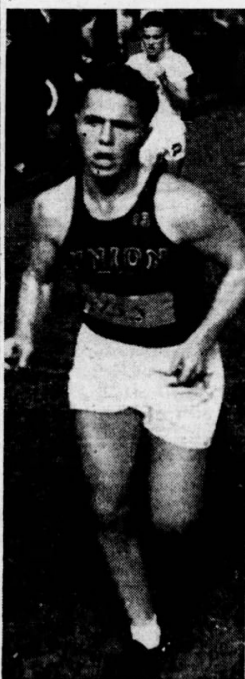
Running without its best man, Thomas Jefferson High of this city finished well, taking fifth place with 177 markers. Bill Nicholas was the first Jeff runner to finish, coming in 12th.

West Side High was sixth in the standings; its ace Silvio Venturi placing 16th. Central High was next with Bill Miles leading the High streets, coming in 11th. South Side was 18th, while Barringer took 20th.

Kearny High, whose ace Al Perritt came in 22nd after suffering a "stitch" at the half-way mark, was eighth. Mountain Lakes nosed out the defending champion, Passaic, by a point to place ninth with 332 points.

MISS. STATE UPSET BY TULANE, 14-13, FOR 1ST LOSS

NEW ORLEANS (AP)—A Tulane football team which had been cuffed around all season rose up with a mighty effort yesterday to knock Mississippi State out of the unbeaten, untied ranks with a 14 to 13 upset victory.

The crowd of more than 25,000 watched in a frenzy throughout the final period as the hard-hitting State eleven smashed once all the way to the three-yard line in a desperate drive to overcome a one-point edge taken by the Greenies in the third.

But Harper Davis, State's brilliant halfback, and Graham Bramlett, powerful fullback, were stopped short of pay dirt in the decisive moment.

The favored Mississippians jumped off to a first period lead when Don Robinson broke loose on a 22-yard scoring jaunt. It didn't seem so important at that time, when Mat Burress was wide with his placement.

But before the period was over, Ernie Crouch shot a 29-yard pass to Dick Hoot, who out-ran the secondary for the final 39 yards of a 68-yard scoring play. Little Harry Levonian, Tulane's placekick specialist, was accurate.

With Davis the spearhead, State marched 35 yards to score in the second period and go into the intermission with a 13 to 7 margin. Davis took it over from the 11. This time, too late as it developed, Burress made a perfect placement.

A fumble by Robinson on the Tulane seven, just when State appeared certain to put the game on ice, set the stage for the final touchdown.

Vandy Spilled By V. M. I.

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP)—A couple of fast driving backs—Lynn Chewning and Bob Thomason—led a charging Virginia Military Institute eleven to a 27-13 victory over Vanderbilt here yesterday.

In an intersectional game marked by spectacular runs and tackles, Chewning plunged over for three touchdowns and Thomason, exhibiting the best throwing arm seen at Dudley Field in many a day, passed for the only sub back Si Hart in the last minute play.
