West Siders win state harrier title
Good Counsel takes Catholic championship

ELIZABETH, Nov. 11.—West Side High's well-balanced team successfully defended its group 4 championship today at Warinanco Park in the state cross-country meet, which saw 40 schools and about 375 runners compete for titles in three divisions.

Another Newark school, Good Counsel, won the Catholic crown. Morris Hills Regional took the championship in the combined division for groups 1, 2 and 3 as Roy Zwirner of Morristown defeated Tom Shutka of Morris Hills, the national indoor mile champion, in a thrilling, record-shattering dual.

TWO-MAN RACE
It was actually a two-man race between Shutka and Zwirner, considered the two top schoolboy runners in the state. By the mile and three-quarter marks, they were 150 yards ahead of the pack. Entering the track for the final quarter mile, the two speedsters were still about even.

Zwirner then started his kick, passed Shutka with about 200 yards to go and won by 20 yards. His time of 12:48.4 set a new record for the extremely difficult two and one-half mile course. Zwirner, South Jersey harrier champion and state group 3 mile titleholder, collapsed at the finish. Shutka, handicapped by a heavy load, cold, required medical attention after the race.

REAL TEAM EFFORT
It was a real team effort that won for West Side. Vinnie Korfmann and Whitely Bauer led the team, finishing sixth and seventh, respectively. Al Costello took ninth place. Kearny, which placed no runners among the top 10, finished second with another good team effort.

Howie Menck of New Brunswick, the unbeaten Central Jersey champ, won the group 4 race easily in 13:11, about 120 yards in front of Major Brown of Barringer. Guy Sodano, the Essex County champion, was third. Norm Hoffman of Columbia and Dick French of Jefferson placed fourth and fifth, respectively.

Rod Zwirner Wins for Morristown

Nationals stop Pistons, 88-86; Lakers romp

FORT WAYNE, Ind., Nov. 11 (AP)—The Syracuse Nationals hung the first defeat of the National Basketball Assn. season on the Fort Wayne Pistons tonight, stopping the league leaders after four straight victories, 88-86.

The loss dropped the Pistons off first place in the percentages, but Philadelphia having won the only game it has played. Syracuse had a 2-2 record.

The Nats took the lead early in the third quarter and held it the rest of the way, building it to 101 points and outlasted the Pistons late game. The last Fort Wayne field goal, cutting the margin to only two points, came just before the gun.

The Pistons led at halftime, 44-41 but were held to one field goal in the third quarter. They moved ahead at 52-45, but Syracuse took the lead at 54-53 and never let go.

Larry Faust scored 23 points for Fort Wayne. Delph Schayes was high for the winners with 22.

SELVY SCORES 24, BUT BULLETS LOSE
GREENVILLE, S. C., Nov. 11 (AP)—Frank Selvy, who repatriated the college scoring records while attending Furman University here, scored 24 points in a losing game tonight as Minneapolis trounced Baltimore 97-87 in a National Basketball Assn. game. Vern Mikkelsen of the Lakers was top scorer of the game with 26.

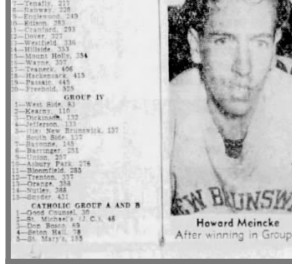
Mikkelsen's marksmanship and ball-stopping helped keep the Lakers in front most of the game in Selvy's 11 rebounds were second; only Don Harrison's 12, Baltimore Captain Paul Hoffman had 17 points for his team's second-best effort.

Mikkelsen was the only player to foul out, in the final minutes. When he was taken out with five personal fouls, Baltimore failed to narrow the Lakers' lead to 81-81. But the former Minnesota forward returned and led the Lakers to a more comfortable margin.
