The individual title fell to Tom Sassman of Kearny, whose finishing kick in the stretch swept him past Bob Schubert of Dickinson.

Tenafly took the team title in a second division embracing high school group 1, 2 and 3 and parochial B and C teams. Pre-meet favorite Bobby Lowe of Englewood won the individual.

Schubert, who had beaten Sassman last Tuesday in the Hudson County meet, led for most of the two and one-half miles today but wilted before Sassman's driving finish. However, Schubert's second place was vital in the team effort, Thomas Jefferson, 123 to 127, since Dickinson barely shaded Kearny was third with 141.

Sassman's winning time was 13:31.5.

In the race among smaller schools, Lowe, recent winner in the Bergen County and a Bergen league meet, finished 20 yards ahead of Jim Curran of Cranford. Bob Skutka of Morris Hills, brother of last year's winner, Tom, finished third and another Skutka, Joe, was 20th.

Tenafly's closest man was fourth but the Bergen team also took fifth and sixth to win the team title handily with 57 points. Morris Hills, in second place, had 102.
