# Essex Catholic, Westfield take cross-country titles

Essex Catholic High, the state's top cross-country team, placed five runners in the first 15 positions and won the state parochial division championship yesterday at Warinanco Park, Elizabeth.

The other team titles went as expected in the 37th annual New Jersey State Interscholastic Athletic Association championships that drew a field of 120 schools and over 800 harriers.

Westfield captured the team title in disputed Group 4 division race. Defending champion Hanover Park cruised to an easy victory in Group 3 and Westwood outdistanced the field in Groups 1-2.

**LINCROFT 2nd**

Essex Catholic scored low total in the parochial race with 39 points, well ahead of second-place Christian Brothers of Lincroft, which had 58.

Coach Fred Dwyer's Newark team has swept everything in sight this year, including 13 straight dual meets. Invitational victories came in the Seton Hall Spiked Shoe, Catholic Conference, Dickinson Invitation, Hudson CYO, Roselle Catholic Invitation and Christian Brothers championships.

The big story here was the individual race between Greg Ryan of Essex Catholic and John Eager of Christian Brothers. Ryan needed medication on his leg prior to the race because of a severe injury suffered a couple of days ago.

**RYAN WINS**

The runners hit the quarter-mile track at the end of the two and one-half mile course going stride for stride. They stayed even until the final 50 yards when Ryan pulled ahead to win by five yards. Ryan's clocking was 12:39.

Don Hobbs was Essex's next placer, grabbing the sixth position. John O'Leary was seventh, Larry Rooney, 10th, and George Bauer, 15th.

Steve Harris of Scotch Plains

defended his individual title in the Group 4 race. The race concluded smoothly until the players linked up to receive their number positions from the judges.

The first 42 finishers went in order, but a mistake at this point upset the scoring finishes of the entire 46-team field, except for Westfield.

**TWO-HOUR DISPUTE**

Westfield already had placed its first five runners in the first 37, so the Blue Devils were declared the team winner with 89 points.

A dispute raged for close to two hours between officials and coaches without settling any of the other team scores.

The race itself was exciting. Harris seemed to have first place all the way, leading by 30 yards entering the enclosed stadium track. Most of the way around it stayed that way until Jefferson's Dave Henderson made a dramatic bid.

Harris held on to win by a

stride in comparatively slow 12:48.4.

The Group 3 race was a repeat of 1962. Hanover Park swept to the crown with the day's low score of 26 and Jack Endrikat cruised around the course in 12:33.3.

The rest of the 20-team field was outclassed as Hanover placed five runners in the top 10. Lee Fortine of Parsippany was second, but Hanover's Roger Anderson was third, Richie Patterson, fourth; John Kikta, eighth; and Mike Sorrell, 10th.

The combined Groups 1 and 2 produced the day's best race. Don Morgan of Clearview pulled five yards ahead of Ed Shattuck of Central Regional with 300 yards to go after the runners had matched stride for one-half mile.

Morgan seemed headed to victory with only 40 yards to go. But Shattuck got his second wind and beat him to the tape to win in 12:34.

WACO, Tex. (AP) — Kentucky's Wildcats slashed their way to one of the major football upsets of the season Saturday by beating Baylor 19-7.

The Wildcats' Rick Norton passed for one touchdown and tossed 73 yards to set up another made from one yard out by K Enbocard.

Darrell Cox intercepted a pass and ran it back 42 yards for another Wildcat touchdown.

The intercepted pass was a misfire from Don Trull, the nation's leading pass gainer and offensive leader going into Saturday's game.

Trull, once he finally started passing, had another fine statistical day. But he never could hit consistently, although one was good for a touchdown.
