

# Cartier sets mark in Group 4 race

Vince Cartier of Scotch Plains did it again yesterday, setting a course record of 12:23.1 at Pennsauken as he won the state Group 4 cross country championship going away for the second straight year.

Just a week ago, in the sectional, Mike Butynes of Sterling toured the same two and a half miles in 12:24. Butynes won the Group 3 title yesterday in a creditable 12:38.5, but he wasn't pushed after setting a fast early pace — and Butynes runs only as fast as he has to.

Essex Catholic put on the strongest team showing, sweeping the first three

places in Parochial A to score an easy team victory.

The other team champions: Group 4, Westfield; Group 3, Dumont; Group 2, Haddon Twp.; Group 1, Jefferson Twp.; and Parochial B, Queen of Peace, Westfield and Queen of Peace were the only successful defenders in this 51st edition of the NJSAA Cross Country championships.

Westfield won about as expected with 91 points to 150 for second-place Cinnaminson and 181 for Middletown. Steve Thatcher of Westfield placed second to Cartier in the individual competition, but he

was 60 yards back at the finish.

Cartier and Harry Kronick of Franklin Twp. battled on even teams over the first mile, going into a set of hills. Then Cartier, who dropped out of the Union County meet last week because of a cold, pulled away and Kronick fell well back.

Steve Gray finished 10th for Westfield.

The Group 3 team battle was supposed to be wide open, and it was, with Dumont finishing on top with 139 points to 182 for Morris Hills and 215 for Moorestown.

Butynes had no trouble winning the individual championship in 12:38.5. He and Greg Miller of Northern Highlands went to the hills in close order. Butynes set a blistering pace and Miller dropped back to finish seventh while John Tanner of Demarest came up to take second place. Rod Brunngraber of Dumont was third.

Haddon Twp. was the expected winner in Group 2, picking up 78 points to outdistance Metuchen, with 130, and Gateway, with 148. Jim Doherty took fifth, Mike Elder 12th and Dan Matoush 15th for the championship team.

Mike Richards of Sparta wound up as the individual winner in 12:48.3 in a mild upset over Don Harivel of New Providence. They battled on even terms until Harivel suffered a stitch. He wound up third behind Barry Johnson of Gateway.

Bernards' three-year reign in Group 1 came to an end as Jefferson Twp. scored 85 points, paced by Dan Slobodzian's eighth-place finish. Bernards was second with 110, and Williamstown took third with 122.

The individual battle was exciting. Junior Willie Marino of Williamstown outkicked Rich Astell of Bernards for a 12:50 gold medal.

Essex Catholic romped in Parochial A with 35 points to 77 for Paul VI of Haddonfield, defender Bergen Catholic was third with 80.

Carlos Bazo led the Essex parade across the line in 12:29, second best time of the day. Then came Chris Imman in 12:34 and Steve Lingori, Martie's older brother, in 12:36.

Queen of Peace placed five runners in the top 10 to easily defend its Parochial B title with 47 points. Red Bank Catholic was second with 79 and Paterson Catholic third with 138.

Tom Clark of Mater Dei won his sixth major title of the season with a 12:32.9 clocking. Co-qualified Gary Riley of Queen of Peace finished fourth, obviously hampered by the after-effects of a bad cold he suffered during the week. Teammates John McIntyre, 6th; Bob Cox, 10th; Steve Tricarico, 12th, and George Bloom, 15th, helped fashion the team victory.

# Lehigh wins finale as records topple

BETHLEHEM, Pa. (AP)—Lehigh University yesterday concluded its finest season since 1951 with a crushing 48-19 victory over Lafayette before a capacity crowd of 17,000.

It was the Engineers' eighth victory in 11 contests. The game was the 107th in college football's longest rivalry for Lehigh in the last 111 meetings. Lafayette maintained a series lead of 62-40-5.

Lehigh's 48-point total es-

tablishes the 1971 team as the highest scoring in Engleer history. Coach Fred Dunlap's squad completed the season with 382 points to better a mark of 259 registered in 1969.

Several other records were established in a one-sided rout. Senior fullback Jack Rizzo of Westover, Mass., gained 3 yards rushing on 31 carries and scored four touchdowns. His 313 is a new Lehigh on game record and he also set a one-season rushing record of 1,143 yards as he gained Most Valuable Player honors in the contest.

Lehigh piled up a record 506 yards on the ground as 664 total offense, both Engleer records, and established a new seasonal rushing record of 2,418 yards. Rizzo scored on runs of one, 13, and 83 yards. Tailback D. Diorio of Bangor, Pa., carried the ball 32 times for 147 yards with touchdown runs of three and 10 yards.
